When Janice Johnson-Brandstrom graduated from GHC in 1954, she never imagined that her hard work and lifelong passion for education would one day allow her to bequeath one of the largest endowments in the GHC Foundation's history, over \$835,000.

As a GHC student, Janice discovered her love of science. She graduated from GHC in 1954, receiving an Alumni Merit Award. Janice credited her ability to complete her degree thanks to the generosity of the Schaffer Family Scholarship, which paid her tuition in full. She then transferred to the University of Washington, and graduated in 1957, with a bachelor of science in chemistry. As a female in a male-dominated field, Janice found it difficult to find work using her chemistry degree. She began teaching and later furthered her education and became a community college counselor.

"This is a wonderful story of a past scholarship recipient paying it forward in a major way," expressed Lisa J. Smith, GHC Foundation Executive Director. "I had the pleasure of working with Ms. Brandstrom—Johnson before her passing in January. She was a truly extraordinary person who was passionate about women having equal opportunities to pursue their education and career, regardless of the field. \$76,053 AWARDED THIS FALL


51 deserving Grays Harbor College students were awarded more than \$76,000 in scholarships during the Foundation's fall cycle.
