

STUDENTS OF GRAYS HARBOR COLLEGE:


I am pleased to have this opportunity to write these words of greeting and good wishes to you.

The Grays Harbor College basketball team had a highly successful season and ended in third place in the newly formed Washington State Junior College league. The Chokers turned in some excellent performances and have the distinction of being undefeated on their home floor in conference play.

All conference honors went to Don Davidson, who was named to the first team, and to Gene Snider, Gene Sampair and Bob Basich, who were given honorable mention. Sampair was awarded the Benson Basketball Trophy, which is given on a basis of athletic ability, inspirational leadership and scholarship.

The outstanding game this year was the tilt against league-leading Clark J. C. of Vancouver. The first half was a one-sided affair, mainly because the over-anxious Chokers were unable to find the hoop. Clark, at one time, was 17 points ahead of the Chokers and at the half, the score was 24-13 in favor of the Vancouverites.

The second half started much the same as the first, with Clark adding two quick baskets before the Chokers caught fire. Then the Grays Harbor five, each man a fighting part of the team, started their comeback. Basket by basket, point by point, the Chokers cut away the Vancouver lead. With each Choker point, the crowd screamed madly, becoming more hysterical as the time ran out. With but ten seconds remaining, Snider tied the game at 39-39, sending the game into an overtime period.

The Chokers made ten points in the overtime, Snider contributed six points and bringing his total for the game to 15, while Davidson added four for a total of 13. Clark made but five points in the extra period, losing its first game in eleven starts to the hard fighting Chokers, 49-44.

The home game against Yakima was a thriller from start to finish, and had to go into an overtime period. The last shot of the game by a Kakima player gave Coach Eddie Smith quite a few gray hairs and is still being talked about by players and spectators alike. The ball hit the basket as the gun sounded, hesitated on the rim and then dropped off, giving the Chokers a 54-53 win.

Against Everett, the Chokers played the entire game without a substistitution. Led by Don Davidson, who took individual scoring honors, the "iron man" five came from behind to win by a score of 57-52.

Much could be said about the individual performances of the players, the coaching of Eddie Smith, but in the limited space available, we can but remind you to look over the statistics and judge for yourselves the ability of GHC's basketball squad.

Next season, barring unforeseen events, the present Choker aggregation will return intact as everyone of them are first year members of Grays Harbor College. With the addition of several promising high school graduates, GHC should be a leading contender for the state title next year. The loss of Coach Eddie Smith to the local high school will be a heavy blow to the Chokers, but the naming of Walter Price, former assistant coach at the University of Idaho, gives us a man well qualified to fill the position vacated by Smith. The students of Grays Harbor College will be behind Coach Price and the Chokers in their bid for the state title next year.
