Writing a Research Paper Documenting Your Sources

One of the most important steps in writing a research paper is documenting your sources! Any information you include in a paper that comes from an outside source must be properly cited, so it is essential you gather the right information when you first get the source. There is a lot to include, so here is a list for some of the main types of sources (remember, just get the info now; we'll fix the format later!):

If you're using a **book** (one in which the author on the cover has written every chapter):

- 1. Author's (or authors') full name(s) as written
- 2. Title of book
- 3. Publishing company
- 4. City of publishing company
- 5. Year of publication
- 6. Page numbers (that your information comes from)

If you're using a **chapter from a book** (this means the particular chapter is by an author and the overall book is *edited* by someone else):

- 1. Author's (or authors') full name(s) as written
- 2. Title of chapter
- 3. Editor(s) of book
- 4. Title of book
- 5. Publishing company
- 6. City of publishing company
- 7. Year of publication
- 8. Page numbers (both where your info comes from and the inclusive pages for the chapter)

If you're using **a journal article**:*

- 1. Author's (or authors') full name(s) as written
- 2. Title of article
- 3. Title of journal
- 4. Date of publication (as specific as possible: day, month, and at least year)
- 5. Page numbers (both where your info comes from and the inclusive pages for the article)

If you're using a **website**,* get as much of this information as you can (and if a lot of it is missing, it might not be a credible website to use!):

- 1. Author's (or authors') full name(s) as written
- 2. Title of webpage
- 3. Title of the larger website that the webpage appeared in
- 4. Date it was last updated
- 5. Date you accessed the site
- 6. Page numbers, if possible, or paragraph numbers, if not
- 7. Website URL
- 8. Date you accessed the information

*If you're using an **online version of a journal article**, you will need information from both lists journal and website—so try to fill out both sets of information.

There are a lot of other kinds of sources available to you—newspapers, interviews, documentaries, etc.— so please don't think you're limited to those listed here. This is just a jumping-off point and if you have questions about other kinds of sources, please ask your teacher or the writing consultant in the Learning Center.
